### Simon (Peter)

- One of Jesus' main apostles (James and John)
- Job: Fisherman
- What is he known for?
  - Walking on water (Matthew 14.28-33)
  - Denying Jesus (Luke 22.54-62)
  - Preaching at Pentecost (Acts 2)
- Authored 1 & 2 Peter

#### James

- Son of Zebedee - Job: Fisherman - What was he known for? - Asking Jesus if he and John should destroy a village (Luke 9.54) - Asked Jesus to sit on either side of his throne (Mark 10.35-40) - Being martyred by Herod (Acts 12.2)

#### John

- Son of Zebedee
- Job: Fisherman
- What is he known for?
  - Call down fire, sit on either side of the throne
  - Taking care of Jesus' mother (John 19.26-27)
- Author Contraction of the Author Contracti
  - Gospel of John
  - 1,2,3 John
  - Revelation

#### Andrew

- Simon Peter's brother - Job: Fisherman - Andrew brought Peter to Jesus (John 1.41-42) - He was a disciple of John the Baptist's first (John 1.35-40)

#### Philip

- Only mentioned eight times in the New Testament (four of which are the list of apostles) - Job: Fisherman (from Bethsaida) - Philip's most notable moment in the gospels is his role in bringing Nathanael to Jesus. Nathanael is most likely another name for Bartholomew - Jesus tests Philip when feeding the 5,000 (John 6.5-7)

#### Bartholomew

- Bartholomew is one of the most obscure apostles
  Job: John 21.1-3
- His name only appears in the four lists of Jesus' 12 main disciples, and he's never listed with any titles or descriptions
- Many modern scholars prefer to take a neutral stance on Nathanael and Bartholomew, suggesting that it's possible

#### Matthew

- Job: tax collector (one of the most reviled professions in first-century Judaism)
- So it was a big deal that Jesus asked Matthew to follow him and be one of his disciples
- Author of Matthew
- By including Matthew among his disciples, Jesus showed that no one—not even those society considered irredeemable—would be excluded from God's table.

#### Thomas

- Better-known as "Doubting Thomas" - John 20.25 - Job: carpenter - One other thing you should know about Thomas: the Bible didn't give him a real name - "Thomas" comes from the Aramaic word tě'omâ, which means "twin."

James son of Alphaeus - James son of Alphaeus is only mentioned in the four lists of apostles - So all we can say for sure about him is that he had a really common name and he was the son of someone named Alphaeus - Pretty much everything else we "know" about him is speculation

#### Jude (Thaddeus)

- Another of the lesser-known and lessunderstood apostles - In two of the lists of apostles, Jude appears to be referred to as Thaddeus. - Since the name Judas had such strong negative associations in the early church, it wouldn't be surprising if Jude preferred to go by another name

#### Simon the Zealot

Simon the Zealot is only mentioned by name in lists of the apostles
So we know almost nothing about him

#### Judas Iscariot - Judas Iscariot is one of the most widely known disciples - He infamously betrayed Jesus for 30 pieces of silver, which lead to Jesus' death on the cross - Regretted his decision and kills himself

#### Who Were The 12?

Normal people
Fisherman, carpenters, tax collectors
They left their lives to follow Jesus
Everyday people doing extraordinary things

#### What About Us?

We are normal people who can do extraordinary things
Would we stop our lives to follow Jesus?
