Naaman Is Healed 2 Kings 5.1-14

Naaman (2 Kings 5. 1)

- Commander of the army of the kings of Syria
- High favor (Honorable)
- He was a mighty man of valor
- BUT... he was a leper
- This leprosy, which, in Israel, would have excluded him from society, did not affect his social life

Leprosy

- Leprosy is a disease that eats away at a person's flesh
- In the Old Testament, the instances of leprosy most likely meant a variety of infectious skin diseases
- In the Bible, people suffering from leprosy were treated as outcasts
- There was no cure for this disease



There is Hope (2 Kings 5. 2-10)

- Naaman is told that his leprosy could be cured by the king of Israel
- He went to the king of Israel looking for the cure
- Naaman departed, and took with him ten talents of silver, six thousand pieces of gold, and ten changes of clothing.
- The King could not heal him... but Elisha could

Instructions (2 Kings 5. 10-12)

- Go and wash in the Jordan 7 times, and your flesh shall be restored, and you shall be clean
- Naaman was angry
- Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus better than all the waters of Israel?







Will You Not Do It? (2 Kings 5. 13-14)

- His servants had to convince him to do it
- He dipped himself 7 times in the Jordan
- His flesh was restored like the flesh of a little child, and he was clean
- Maybe the rivers in Damascus were better, but that wasn't the point

Are We Willing to dip in the Jordan?

- We might not have leprosy but we all have sin in our lives
- Similar to leprosy, sin will eat away at our lives if we let it.
- Only baptism can cleanse and make us whole again
