#### II Chronicles 20 and 27

#### **UNCONVENTIONAL WISDOM** Today, we are going to consider lessons from two kings of Judah. The first king is Jehoshaphat and we will consider his unorthodox approach to things in II **Chronicles 17, 19 and 20.** The second king is Jotham, whose father was

Uzziah. His entire reign is recorded in II Chronicles 27.

**UNCONVENTIONAL WISDOM Background on Jehoshaphat:** Really good king for the most part. II Chron. 17:6, "his heart was courageous in the ways of the Lord." - Made some unwise alliances- II Chron. 18 and 20 with Ahab and Ahaziah, kings of Israel.

  - First, he instituted a national education program based off of God's Word. Imagine that!- II Chron. 17:7-9
    - I would hate for our children to be taught truth and wholesome morals.
    - That sounds a little dangerous to me.

  - Second, he set up a court system with judges, designed to make decisions based on the judgments of the Lord.- II Chron. 19:5-7
- They were instructed not to take bribes and be impartial.
- I'm not gonna lie I'm a little skeptical about this.

- He made some "strange decisions" that somehow turned out good.
  - Third, at the threat of war, he.....
    - Proclaimed a national fast.
    - Led his country in a national prayer.
  - Presided over an occasion of national worship.
     You mean to tell me, that he didn't contact the war department about creating a draft or increasing the weapons supply?

**UNCONVENTIONAL WISDOM** He made some "strange decisions" that somehow turned out good. Look at how all this turned out. God provided. Judah was richly blessed. I would love to see another nation opt for these approaches to things.

**Background on Jotham:** 

25 years old when he took over as king for his father Uzziah.

Reigned for 16 years.

He did what was right in the eyes of the Lord.
In fact, II Chron. 27:6 says, "So Jotham became mighty, because he ordered his ways before the Lord."

**UNCONVENTIONAL WISDOM** Two unconventional lessons from Jotham: **#1- He taught us that you can break the cycle** inherited from your parents. How many people are going to perish because of the improper beliefs of their parents? – #2- Your significance and positive contributions are not measured in quantity but quality. He was mighty, yet died at the age of 41.
